The Pastor's Corner



Dear sisters and brothers.

Greetings!

Every four years, political pundits and media consultants talk about the "Catholic" vote in presidential elections. I do not know why. There is no monolithic Catholic

vote. Many Catholics vote for one party, and many Catholics vote for the other main party. Still other Catholics vote as independents. There is pluralism in Catholic voting preferences. Neither of the main political parties fully embrace Catholic social and sexual teaching! We are grateful for the US Bishops' Conference for promoting a wonderful document called "Faithful Citizenship." This document asks Catholic voters to conduct research on candidates for elected government positions on local, state and federal offices. "Faithful Citizenship" asks Catholic voters to find out the positions of all candidates and where they stand on particular issues.

We are not abiding by single issue politics such as abortion, which is extremely important. However, other issues also need to

be carefully addressed such as the mental acuity of each candidate. That widens our scope, and gives us hope to vote with a clear conscience. In today's first reading from the Book of Jeremiah, we find language for hope and rejoicing. Jeremiah anticipates the future restoration of Israel. This is clearly a moment of divine triumph as the remnant of Israel. I hope and pray that we restore unity in our country.

In today's Gospel passage from Mark, blind man Bartimaeus has his eyesight restored by Jesus. As Catholic voters, we should not be "blind" to our political choices. Nor should we be manipulated by family members or friends on who to vote for. Voting is a sacred privilege and needs to be carefully reflected with a thorough examination of conscience. Bartimaeus has his eyesight restored by Jesus and he also had the insight to see Jesus as he really is.

When you vote, please read the ballot with your eyesight and the insight to make what you believe is the best choice. Voting is a civic duty and a moral responsibility.
