The Pastor's Corner



Dear sisters and brothers,

Our parish is part of the Archdiocese of New York, which is part of the US Catholic Conference of Bishops of America, which is part of the Roman Catholic Church in the world. Therefore, we are all connected to one another like parts of

the body. In today's second reading from the first letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul writes "As a body is one though it has many parts, and all parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ... Now the body is not a single part, but many."

Since we all agree that we are connected to a greater Body of Christ other than ourselves, we are part of the Archdiocese of New York as well as the Franciscan Province of Our Lady of Guadalupe. This weekend, I will be speaking at all the Masses regarding the yearly Cardinal's Appeal for the Archdiocese. Records indicate that our parish has been generous before in the past. I am humbly asking that we be generous this year. Last year, our parish donated \$47,000 to Appeal. Two years before that, our parish donated over \$98,000 to the Appeal. This year, I am asking that we donate at least \$65,000 to the Cardinal's Appeal. The goal of the Archdiocese this year is \$21 million dollars. They break it down to five sections: \$9M for financial assistance for struggling parishes; \$3.5M for pastoral administration, grants and services; \$3M for retired priests, priestly education and formation programs; \$3M for Catholic education; \$2.5M for charitable outreach. NOT a single dime goes to cases that have caused scandal! I assure you it does not!

I will be asking permission from our newly formed finance council with our two trustees — to give a substantial, designated gift to the Cardinal's Appeal. What would be this designated gift? We would designate the second section "pastoral administration, grants and services," because the Archdiocesan Offices of Real Estate and Insurance have been extremely helpful to our parish the last few months. I mean really helpful!

I fully understand that some parishioners may feel ambivalent to donating to the Cardinal's Appeal. I am personally appealing to you to faithfully reconsider. Some parishioners have already told me that they will be designating their donations to worthy causes such as Catholic Education and Charitable Outreach. You all have the spiritual and legal right to donate your funds to any specific section of the Cardinal's Appeal.

Again, as St. Paul writes in the second reading, there are many parts to the body. Let us be part of the Body of Christ!
