The Pastor's Corner



Dear sisters and brothers,

What is the difference between a tariff and tithing? A tariff is a tax imposed by the government of a country on imports or exports on another country. Its purpose is to gain revenue, as well as to reduce pressure from foreign competition. The recent tariffs

imposed upon Canada and Mexico have caused controversy in our own North America. I thought we were allies — not competitors. But tithing in the Bible is the practice of giving 10 percent of one's earnings, possessions or productions to God. The word "tithe" comes from Hebrew and means "a tenth." Many other houses of worship, such as Jewish temples and Protestant churches, have adapted this practice to support their local faith community. It is a free will offering, not a tax.

Our weekend's readings view "tithing" not a as a financial transaction, but as a vocational choice to serve God with free will. Throughout salvation history, God has used various messengers to communicate his words to his people. Today's readings share a common quality: Isaiah, St. Paul and Simon Peter have humbling realizations of their own sinfulness in the presence of true holiness. This is a "tithing" of vocational discernment.

In the first reading from the prophet Isaiah, he purges his sinfulness and responds to the call of God: "Here I am," I said, "Send me!" In the second reading, Paul says in the first letter to the Corinthians "By the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace to me has not been ineffective." In the Gospel passage from Luke, Simon Peter admits his sin. But Jesus encourages his vocational choice by saying "Simon Peter, do not be afraid, from now on you will be catching men." And women too!

As we proceed into the beginning stages of our synodal process, let us all together "tithe" our vocational discernment in our wonderful parish!

Good Climate News – Part 2 of 2

Solar energy is through the roof! It's getting cheaper and exceeding expectations. China is out in front most dramatically, installing more solar panels than any other country and at an alarming rate. They're getting creative too — or daring. Satellite pictures reveal one installation in the Kubuqi Desert that when looked at from above forms the outline of a running horse. The U.S. follows in a strong second place, thanks to the Inflation Reduction Act, and India too is advancing. Solar panels in deserts provide shade and windbreak. They allow moisture to accumulate beneath and are becoming little nurseries of new growth of grasses and other small plants and species. There are four deserts here in the U.S.
