The Pastor's Corner



Dear sisters and brothers,

Greetings!

The Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ on Palm Sunday has been proclaimed for nearly two thousand years. The Passion speaks for itself. Today's version from St. Luke includes scenes from the Last Supper as well as the Passion of

Jesus hung upon the Cross. Regarding the Last Supper, Jesus offers the first cup to his disciples to reinforce the need for fellowship and community to "share it among yourselves." The second cup serves as a reminder of how God saved the Israelites from Egyptian slavery. Jesus is now the "Precious Blood" for his disciples and for those who worship Jesus. This invokes the teaching of the "New Covenant" with Jesus.

The Passion on the Cross signifies that Jesus of fully aware of his betrayal by Judas; an unfair trial; Peter denies Jesus three times; most of the Apostles were not present when Jesus died on the Cross; confusion existed among the followers of Jesus and the agony of pain and suffering.

Jesus' mercy and self-control are evidenced by his prayer to his Father that the people be forgiven for what they are doing. It is interesting to note that in St. Luke's version of the Passion, Jesus's last words on the Cross are not the cry of anguish that we hear in St. Mark and St. Matthew's versions. When he says "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit," he affirms his trust in God's saving power that will ultimately vindicate him.

There are trials and tribulations in all generations since the death of Jesus on the Cross. But there are examples of "rising to the occasion" apart from the Resurrected Jesus we will celebrate next Easter Sunday. On Saturday, April 5, I marched in the "Hands Off" protest march down Fifth Avenue from Bryant Park to Madison Park. We began as strangers, but ended upon as friends united in the common cause of preserving our democracy and protecting our Constitution. People from all walks of life including Republicans, Independents and Democrats bonded together for 20 blocks to rally for Federal workers; object to dangerous tariffs; plead for the environment; protect the rights of US veterans; protect responsible medical science and other worthwhile issues.

Yes, the people of the US "rose to the occasion" by being walking witnesses to these worthy causes. One sign from a young family from Brooklyn summed it up best: "The power of the people is greater than the people in power." The Passion of Jesus Christ has new meaning and passion for those standing up for human rights!

There will be one Mass on Easter Monday at 11 AM. There are no confessions on Holy Saturday, Easter Sunday, and Easter Monday.
