The Pastor's Corner



Dear sisters and brothers,

Greetings!

Our immigration attorney Ginny Nuñez has been advising many of her clients with a special packet entitled "Know Your Rights" as immigrants. Whether by a video or in person, Ms. Nuñez informs immigrants that every person in the U.S., regardless of their immigration status, has some basic rights. Three basic rights are: 1) You always have the right to remain silent and not answer questions. 2) You

can refuse searches of your body, your home and your belongings without a warrant. 3) You cannot be arrested or detained for no reason. Ms. Nuñez believes these basic rights provides dignity for each person and extends hospitality to the stranger in our midst.

The readings this weekend highlight the importance of hospitality in the Bible—one from the Old Testament, the second from the New Testament. Hospitality is extended in today's first reading from the Book of Genesis, when Abraham and Sarah provide food, drink and rest for three strangers outside their tent. One of them rewards the hospitality with these words "I will surely return to you about this time next year, and Sarah will then have a son." After many years of being childless, Isaac their first child will be born.

The Gospel passage from St. Luke indicates the twofold nature of hospitality to Jesus from the sisters, Martha and Mary. Martha is the active sister paying attention to the physical details of hospitality. Whereas Mary sits and listens to Jesus as the contemplative sister who spends quality time with Jesus. Both forms of hospitality are important—the active and contemplative which also mirrors ministry and prayer for the average Catholic Christian. Many of us struggle with ministry and prayer and try to strike a balance between the two. Martha welcomes Jesus while Mary prays with Jesus. Both types of hospitality are important whether we extend them to U.S. born friends or the stranger in our midst.
