The Pastor's Corner

Dear sisters and brothers,

This weekend, the Catholic Church in America celebrates the 111th Anniversary of World Day of Immigrants and Refugees. Immigrants and refugees are an integral part of our nation's history. Unfortunately, recent events indicate that a shroud of xenophobia has struck our cherished nation's tradition of "Welcoming the Stranger." The welcome mat has been pulled out beneath the feet of immigrants, refugees and asylees and are mercilessly scorned for their presence by the present Federal administration. Has the government forgotten their ancestral roots?



Years ago, the U.S. Bishops wrote an insightful pastoral letter about immigrants and refugees. This letter looks at all sides of this grappling issue in the United States. May I offer a gentle reminder of its current importance. The pastoral letter is "Justice for Immigrants: A Journey for Hope." I encourage parishioners and friends to read the entire letter before engaging in arguments with loved ones and neighbors. The letter states five primary points:

1. Persons Have the Right to Find Opportunities in Their Homeland.

This principle states that a person has a right not to migrate. Economic, social, and political conditions in their homeland should provide an opportunity for a person to work and support his or her family in dignity and safety.

2. Persons Have a Right to Migrate to Support Themselves and Their Families.

When persons are unable to find work and support themselves and their families, they have a right to migrate to other countries and work. No person ever enjoys leaving their homeland. However, they need to find ways for gainful employment and to support their families.

3. Sovereign Nations Have Right to Control Their Borders.

The Church recognizes the right of the sovereign nation to protect and control its borders in the common good of its citizens. Nations have an obligation to the universal common good. Ideally, America should establish an immigration system that provides legal avenues for persons to enter the nation legally in a safe, orderly and dignified manner to obtain jobs and reunite with family members.

4. Refugees and Asylum Seekers Should Be Afforded Protection.

Persons who flee their home countries because they fear persecution should be afforded safe haven and protection in another country, including the United States. The US government should employ a refugee and asylum system that protects asylees, refugees and other forced migrants and offers them a haven from persecution.

5. The Human Rights and Human Dignity of Undocumented Migrants.

Persons who enter a nation without proper authorization or who over-stay their visas should be respected with respect and dignity. They should be afforded due process of the law and, if applicable, allowed to articulate a fear of return to their homeland before a qualified adjudicator. Due process has been a mainstay of our judicial system of fairness and understanding.

Yes, our Migrant Center is open Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Please call for an appointment. We also partner with an excellent immigration attorney, Ginny Nunez, Esq. Her office is in the parish neighborhood.

Please pray for all immigrants, refugees and asylees in our nation during these stressful times!
